The Winder Police Department continues to be committed to providing quality and professional law enforcement services to all the citizens and businesses of the City of Winder. Our primary goal remains to make all of Winder a better and safer place to live and work. During 2021, we continued to make strides toward this goal. Our officers responded to over 16,000 calls for service during the year. In addition, we believe proactive policing is important in trying to keep our city safer and better. Our officers conducted over 6800 traffic stops and over 20,000 area checks during the year in addition to responding to calls.

Our department also strives to improve or get better each year. As part of that goal, we put an emphasis on training. We feel that one of the main ways to improve as individual officers and as a department is through training. In 2021 we continued our focus on training with a total of over 6400 hours of training across the department which is an average of 129 hours per officer. The annual state requirement of training hours per officer for their certification is 20 hours.

During 2021, our Crime Suppression unit conducted a large multi-month undercover drug investigation to address a large open air drug market that had evolved in a community in the city of Winder. The investigation resulted in 28 individuals being charged with various drug and gang charges. This investigation also involved WPD utilizing resources from multiple other state and local law enforcement agencies to reach a successful conclusion.

The Winder Police department strives to practice Community Oriented Policing. We believe in building relationships with our citizens and the community and then working together to make Winder a better and safer place to live and work. This past year our officers were involved in working events like the Christmas parade, the Summer's End Road race, the Downtown Summer Concert series, the Swinging Medallions concert, and various other events and races. In addition, our officers participated in Spooktacular and Christmas with a Hero where officers get to have direct positive connections with our citizens.

While we listed several things WPD has done toward reaching our goals, the most important aspect for us having any success is our community. We are so blessed with the community that we serve. Even in the recent times in our country of the anti-police rhetoric and the movements to attack the police by the media, some citizens, and politicians, the citizens of Winder continue to support our department and our officers in so many ways. We continue to receive support from all aspects of our great community in the City of Winder. Our community joins us in working together to make Winder better. We look forward to working together in 2022 as our community grows.

Winder Police Department's 2022 Goals and Objectives

Patrol

- 1. Recruit and retain highly trained and motivated law enforcement officers to fully staff the Uniform Patrol Division and Traffic Unit.
 - A. Recruit highly competent personnel by utilizing up to date agency brochures to advertise the incentives offered by the department.
 - **B.** Attend various job fairs throughout the state on a quarterly basis by utilizing officers within the organization.
 - C. Build training around the needs and focus of officers.
- 2. Maintain consistency amongst all four shifts ensuring the departments policies and mission are met.
 - A. Develop a training and reference guide for supervisors to refer to as needed.
 - **B.** Hold In-service training for all supervisors and officers to provide them with consistent and the most up to date information.
 - C. Hold quarterly supervisor meetings to address any concerns or areas for improvement.
- **3.** Continue a proactive policing approach to help prevent and reduce crime while building relationships within the community we serve.
 - A. Performing area checks of residential and business locations.
 - B. Agency representation at community events.
 - C. Traffic enforcement details to address problematic issues and citizen complaints.
 - **D.** Use of technology as tool for Uniform Patrol Division (i.e. Flock cameras, intelligence led policing)





Winder Police Department's 2022 Goals and Objectives (continued)

Criminal Investigations

- 1. Strive to improve follow up investigations and interviews by monitoring the local area arrest booking records of county detention centers more closely.
 - A. Develop a network of surrounding agencies and their arrest booking records so that when an offender for a crime committed in the City of Winder is arrested, a follow up interview can be conducted before they are released from custody.
 - B. Make sure every investigator has viewing access rights to the Barrow County Detention Center's booking records in the New World database and these are monitored regularly by each investigator and cross referenced with suspects/offenders in the investigator's current case assignments.
- 2. Hold monthly training sessions within the investigative division that are primarily related to investigative duties.
 - A. Training sessions can be on recent updates in law and recent case law reviews that pertain to search and seizure or electronic forensics such as cell phones and computer searches. A training instructor within CID will be responsible for selecting and teaching a topic each month.
 - B. Training may also be focused on crime scene processing techniques and checklist forms specific to certain crime types that are utilized when an on-call investigator is called out to a crime scene after hours.





Winder Police Department's 2022 Goals and Objectives (continued)

Crime Suppression

- 1. Participate in more ride-alongs with patrol officers that are focused on more targeted law enforcement efforts such as narcotics and fugitive apprehension.
 - A. Ride alongs should be conducted on a monthly basis at a minimum and should have a specific focus. CSU detectives will use this opportunity to train newer or less-experienced officers in how to better observe for and detect criminal activity as it occurs.
- 2. Develop a better working relationship with state and local probation/parole officers in order to improve communications regarding suspects and repeat offenders who are on probation or parole.
- 3. Be more proactive and timely with the service of valid arrest warrants.
 - A. Closely monitor the arrest warrants being taken by both patrol and investigators and ensure a timely attempt to serve all warrants are being made.






Winder Police Department's 2022 Goals and Objectives (continued)

Code Enforcement

- 1. Continually monitor the main thoroughfares into the City of Winder in an effort to maintain and enhance the attractiveness of the city. It is our goal to establish the City of Winder as a premier location for community growth and development.
 - A. Continue to foster a good working relationship with ESG. By working closely and communicating with ESG, we will be able to resolve issues such as tall grass and debris that have the potential to threaten the city's aesthetic appeal.
 - **B.** Maintain a proactive approach to help solve community problems before they impact the community in a negative way.
- 2. Cultivate positive relationships with members of the community.
 - A. Maintain our desire to perform our duties in a fair and consistent manner throughout the city.
 - **B.** Strive for voluntary compliance utilizing enforcement measures only when voluntary compliance efforts have been exhausted. Support community members by working together to resolve issues and providing the educational tools needed to ensure understanding of compliance requests.








In-service course on tactical firearms. Moving and shooting tactics were taught.







Motor Vehicle Accidents







Key Investigative Cases in 2021

On April 5, 2021, Patrol took a report from a 17-year-old female who disclosed that her step-father had molested her when she was younger. An investigator took over the case and scheduled a forensic interview with the victim. During the interview, she disclosed very specific details of the encounters and told interviewers that the molesting began when she was in middle school and continued until she was sixteen. Based on this information as well as additional evidence that was discovered during the course of the investigation, the suspect was charged with Sexual Battery, Cruelty to Children 1st Degree and Child Molestation. It was also determined that the suspect had been using a false name to avoid other legal issues he was involved in and had violated a previous protective order issued by the court on behalf of the victim in this case. The suspect was also charged with giving false name and information to law enforcement and violating the court order. Several months after this investigation was concluded, the suspect plead guilty in exchange for a ten-year prison sentence.

On October 2, 2021, patrol officers responded to a bombing that occurred in front of a residence on Holly Drive. Upon arrival, it was determined that some form of explosive device had been detonated which damaged a total of seven nearby homes, a car and a brick mailbox. Multiple houses had shattered windows and the car parked close to where the bomb went off appeared to be a total loss. Further investigation led to the development of two suspects. On October 4th, a search warrant was executed at an address outside the city limits with the assistance of the Barrow County Sheriff's Office and the GBI. Evidence related to the bombing was located at this residence and one suspect was taken into custody at that time. The second suspect was arrested on October 12th.

On November 2, 2021, patrol officers took a report in reference to possible elder abuse and financial exploitation of a married couple. The case was taken over by the investigative division. After a month long investigation, it was determined that a caretaker who had been hired by the elderly couple had been taking advantage of them. The investigation revealed that the caretaker had withdrawn approximately \$40,000 from the couple's bank account over a period of just a couple of months. Arrest warrants were issued for the offender and the case is now pending trial.







Crime Suppression Unit



The Winder PD Crime Suppression Unit, with the assistance of the GBI and the Appalachian Drug Task Force, conducted a five-month long drug and gang investigation in the Spring of this year. During the course of this investigation, numerous undercover drug purchases were made from a total of 28 individuals inside the city limits of Winder. A great deal of intelligence was also gathered about the involvement of many of these individuals in local gang organizations. As a result of this investigation, search warrants were obtained for six residents inside the city limits of Winder. All six search warrants were executed simultaneously with the aid of numerous law enforcement agencies at the local and state level. These search warrants netted additional narcotic seizures along with an illegal firearm seizure and several vehicles that were determined to be used for the distribution of the drugs were also seized. A total of 31 suspects were arrested and are awaiting trial on their charges of distributing narcotics along with their gang association and activities.
