





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The City of Winder Livable Centers Initiative Study is a collaborative effort between the Atlanta Regional Commission, the City of Winder, a consultant team, and community stakeholders. The study was funded by the Atlanta Regional Commission and the City of Winder, Georgia.

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Part 1: Introduction

City of Winder Livable Centers Initiative Study

INTRODUCTION

The Livable Centers Initiative (LCI) has been nationally recognized for its success in leveraging public investment to promote quality growth and private development in the towns and population or employment centers of the Atlanta region. Winder is the first community in Barrow County to be selected for participation in the LCI program.

Winder's decision to pursue an LCI study stems from its desire to develop creative solutions and comprehensive strategies for land use and development patterns, transportation, economic development, and housing. The City aspires to find a unifying urban design theme and re-establish a pedestrian-friendly character.

The study's main mission is to explore appropriate policies that demonstrate a sensitive, imaginative, and comprehensive approach to the planning, design, and development process. The study puts forth recommendations to improve pedestrian and vehicular infrastructure, develop strategies to discourage sprawl-type development, address traffic calming, and beautify existing corridors.

Regional Context


The City of Winder, the county seat of Barrow County, is approximately 40 miles east northeast of Atlanta and 20 miles west of Athens, Georgia. Located on the former railroad link between Athens and Atlanta, it is now accessible from Highway 316, which lies about four miles from the old courthouse. Interstate 85 is a ten-mile drive to the north.

Goals

The goals of the Livable Centers Initiative program are to:

- Encourage a diversity of medium to high-density, mixed-income neighborhoods, employment, shopping and recreation choices at the activity and town center level.
- Provide access to a range of travel modes including transit, roadways, walking and biking to enable access to all uses within the study area.
- Encourage integration of uses and land use policies/regulations with transportation investments to maximize the use of alternate modes.

- 4. Through transportation investments, increase the desirability of redevelopment of land served by existing infrastructure at activity and town centers.
- 5. Preserve the historic characteristics of activity and town centers and create a community identity.
- Develop a community-based transportation investment program at the activity and town center level that will identify capital projects, which can be funded in the annual Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Provide transportation infrastructure incentives for jurisdictions to take local actions to implement the resulting activity or town center study goals.
- Provide for the implementation of the Regional Development Plan (RDP) policies, quality growth initiatives and Best Development Practices in the Study Area, both through local governments and at the regional level.
- Develop a local planning outreach process that promotes the involvement of all stakeholders, particularly low income, minority and traditionally under-served populations.



Location of the Winder LCI study area in the Atlanta region

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
10. Provide planning funds for development of activity and town centers that showcase the integration of land use policy and regulation and transportation investments with urban design tools.

Study Area

The study area was chosen to focus on the core of Winder. It encompasses more than 610 acres of land, including downtown, adjacent historic

residential neighborhoods, the May Street corridor and areas north of Fort Yargo State Park, Holly Hill Mall, and some light industrial areas near the Community Center.

The entire study area, except for a few parcels in the southwest corner, lies within the Winder city limits. Most of the study area is within a ten-minute walk of the old Barrow County Courthouse.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The diverse findings and recommendations in this study address a variety of issues and opportunities within Winder and put forth solutions to improve the relationship between land use patterns and transportation based on the goals above. What follows is a summary of the primary recommendations for specific projects within the study area. More information on each of the following recommendations can be found in Part 4, which also includes policy recommendations.


Land Use Recommendations

- Redevelop eastern downtown with a series of civic and private buildings that will help define a new public park (see pages x-x).
- Redevelop the site of Holly Hill Mall and adjacent properties to include a mix of shopping, offices, multifamily and senior residences, townhouses, and public greens (see pages x-x).
- Redevelop the block of May Street east of Horton Street with sidewalk-oriented retail buildings as well as residences, to set a new tone for development along May Street (see page x).

- Rehabilitate the old mill building on East Athens Street to house a mix of residential and commercial lofts.
- Rehabilitate the old Courthouse for a use deemed appropriate by the community, potentially as a civic building.
- Amend the Winder Code of Ordinances to support the goals of the LCI by allowing residential uses downtown by right, allowing residences without fire sprinklers per the International Building Code, and improving sign regulations.

Pedestrian/Bicycle Recommendations

- Implement the Broad Street streetscape (already programmed) as a crucial transformation of downtown Winder's most important street.
- Construct a pedestrian and bicycle link between downtown and Fort Yargo State Park through a series of improvements along Jackson Street.
- Extend the Broad Stret streetscape improvments along Athens Street, Candler Street, and Midland Avenue to further enhance downtown.
- Construct a Downtown Cultural Loop walking and biking route to connect downtown land-

- marks, business, and residential areas.
- Construct a mult-use trail along Lily Drive and Lee Street to connect residential areas with public services and parks.
- Improve safety and aesthetics along May Street with more than a mile of pedestrian improvements.
- Repair sidewalks and construct them where missing throughout the study area.

Vehicular Recommendations

- Implement intersection improvements (already programmend) on Athens Street at Horton Street and McNeal Road.
- Conduct a supplemental truck traffic study to evaluate methods to reduce truck traffic.
- Improve traffic flow in the study area by strategically removing stop signs and speed bumps and installing traffic calming measures.
- Install left turn lanes on Athens Street at Center Street.
- Close Candler Street to automobile traffic from Park Avenue to Midland Avenue.
- Improve the Athens Street/King Street/East Midland Avenue intersection.
- Widen and add pedestrian improvements on Athens Street from Horton Street to North Broad Street.

Transit Recommendations

- Create a carpool lot in the Holly Hill Mall Area.
- · Begin an on-demand transit study.

Economic Development/Marketing Recommendations

- Designate an Economic Development Manager responsible for small business/retail recruitment, marketing, and tourism development.
- Create small business incubator space at Holly Hill Mall.
- Consider a Tax Allocation District (TAD) or Community Improvement District (CID) as funding alternatives for public improvements identified in the plan.
- Create a uniform brand identity for Winder to market the community to its various targets (lo-

- cals, new residents, active lifestyles, new business and investment).
- Build marketing collateral to position Winder and its downtown as a destination
- · Create recurring event activity in downtown
- · Create business support programming.
- Create incentive program for investment through façade grants, business license abatement, marketing assistance, business planning, and other small grants.
- Market key redevelopment sites shown in the Concept Plans on pages x-x.
- · Develop a branded wayfinding system.
- Create marketing collateral to capitalize on Fort Yargo's visitor market.
- Recruit market-rate residential above shops in downtown.

Other Recommendations

- Pursue the creation of Design Guidelines for infill development in central Winder.
- Reexamine the extent of the city historic district.
- Install historic markers at historic buildings and sites throughout the study area.
- · Plan a Winder Tour of Homes.
- Amend the Code of Ordinances to prevent demolition of historic structures.
- Update and strengthen the Winder Historic Preservation Design Review Guidelines.
- Create a tree ordinance and conduct neighborhood tree plantings to expand and protect Winder's tree cover.
- Create a new park at the western corner of Midland Avenue and Church Street.
- Convert the police parking lot on Woodlawn Avenue into a public greenspace.
- Acquire property northeast of the Community Center for the creation of a 4.5-acre downtown public park to include lawns, a play fountain, skate park, small amphitheater, and adjacent farmers market space (see page x).
- Improve lighting in parks and on residential streets.
- Continue upgrades of historic sewer, water, and gas lines in need of replacement.





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INTRODUCTION:

The Livable Centers Initiative (LCI) is a grant program offered by the Atlanta Regional Commission that encourages local jurisdictions to plan and implement strategies that link transportation improvements with land use development strategies to create sustainable, livable communities consistent with regional development policies. The primary goals of the program are to:

- Encourage a diversity of mixed-income residential neighborhoods, employment, shopping and recreation choices at the activity center, town center and corridor level
- Provide access to a range of travel modes including transit, roadways, walking and biking to enable access to all uses within the study area
- Develop an outreach process that promotes the involvement of all stakeholders

The City of Winder LCI, conducted in 2009-10, was completed and adopted by the City in March 2010. The study area is centered on the core of Winder. It includes downtown, adjacent historic residential neighborhoods, the May Street corridor and areas of Fort Yargo State Park, Holly Hill Mall, and some light industrial areas near the Community Center. The Study Area encompasses 610 acres and with the exception of a few parcels, is within Winder city limits.

The goals of the 2009-10 LCI were to develop a long-term vision for promoting growth within its downtown core, along May Street, and in nearby neighborhoods by promoting visual

appeal, establishing a compatible mix of land uses, preserving local identity, ensuring multiple transportation options, reducing truck traffic, improving public safety, and supporting economic development.



Historic Courthouse Renovation

Since completing the LCI study, the City has made positive strides towards implementing the goals and objectives of the study. The City has completed their North Broad Street Revitalization Project, roadway and pedestrian improvements along McNeal Road, pedestrian improvements along North Jackson Street, and the Downtown Block Improvements extending the revitalization efforts. The City has dedicated resources to code amendments, redevelopment projects, way-finding and numerous economic development avenues.

EVALUATION & APPRAISAL:

The Evaluation & Appraisal section of this report provides a discussion of the LCI plan implementation progress since 2010, when the original study was completed. It highlights completed action, new developments and infrastructure upgrades, as well as actions that have not been accomplished from the 2009-10 action plan.

Overall Plan Success

The 2009-10 LCI study identified 26 transportation related projects and 33 other including local initiatives numerous development marketing and economic programs. The progress priority on transportation projects has sparked critical redevelopment projects in the downtown core.

Since the 2009-10 LCI study the City of Winder has completed several transportation related projects with several projects currently underway and nearing completion. These completed and underway transportation projects have been achieved using mostly local funding sources. Some are combined with GDOT funding sources, such as new or

upgraded infrastructure to improve efficiency along state routes. The City Staff and consultant teams have worked closely with GDOT to apply for project funding from a variety of available sources. In addition and where possible, the City has been diligent in monitoring private development to ensure that it does not occur in a way that precludes recommended transportation projects.

progress most in regards implementing the vision of the 2009-10 LCI has been in pedestrian improvement projects. The city has recently completed or is in the process of completing pedestrian improvement projects along McNeal Road. North Broad Street. Woodlawn Avenue, Athens Street, Candler Street, and several others throughout the study area. In addition, the City has helped establish and maintain character in its downtown core through installation of historic markers and through numerous events and festivals throughout the year.

Implementation Challenges

The City of Winder, like most other LCI communities, has had some difficulty in implementing the overall vision of the LCI due to the lack of funding. The overall state of the economy has slowed development down in the City as well as the rest of the nation, forcing communities to further prioritize future projects with some projects being paused altogether from the planning process. In addition, aging and undersized stormwater infrastructure has caused capital improvement funds to be diverted towards these necessary improvements. Coordination with the railroad has also presented challenges to implementing transportation projects.

REPORT OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

As described above, since the 2009-10 LCI study the City of Winder has completed several transportation related projects with several projects currently nearing completion. The City completed the North Broad Street Revitalization Project, thousands of feet of sidewalk improvements, constructed a new park in eastern downtown and relocated City Hall. A detailed report of accomplishments can be found in the appendix.

CONCEPT PLAN REVISIONS:

With the exception of a few projects that have been marked as "Not Relevant" the projects and policies from the 2009-10 LCI Plan are still in line with the City's vision and goals. There are no major changes to the original plan.


RECENT DEVELOPMENT:


Continued Implementation of the Plan

To ensure implementation of the projects identified in the following tables and the policies of the 2009-10 LCI, continued diligence will be required on the part of the City's residents, businesses, and leaders. It is critical to the effectiveness of the LCI Plan that citizens, businesses, and community leaders are or become engaged in this process. This area of the planning process needs to be improved upon in order for project implementation to be successful. Stakeholders must cooperate with City government staff and developers to ensure that private developments support the vision of the LCI Plan and are satisfactorily implemented.


The City of Winder must continue to stay engaged in review of potential funding options for transportation related projects. Although the City has not successfully competed for LCI funding throughout the years, the City must continue their funding requests for transportation projects that may also be funded through a variety of other sources administered through the ARC. It is critical that the City of Winder continues to coordinate and work with ARC staff to ensure that projects requiring transportation funding are included in the future Regional Transportation Plans (RTP's) as well as being identified in the County's Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP).


